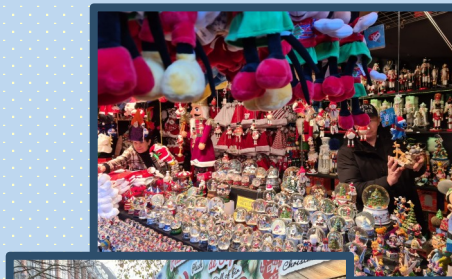

Building Vocabulary – 5 Top Tips

- 1. Develop a reading habit.** Vocabulary building is easiest when you encounter words in context. Seeing words appear in a novel or a newspaper article can be far more helpful than seeing them appear on vocabulary lists. Not only do you gain exposure to unfamiliar words; you also see how they're used.
- 2. Use dictionaries and thesauruses.** Online dictionaries and thesauruses are helpful resources if used properly. They can jog your memory about synonyms that would actually be better words in the context of what you're writing. A full dictionary definition can also educate you about antonyms, root words, and related words, which is another way to learn vocabulary.
- 3. Play word games.** Classic games like Scrabble and Boggle can function as a fun way to expand your English vocabulary. Crossword puzzles can as well. If you really want to be efficient, follow up rounds of these word games with a little note-taking. Keep a list of the different words you learned while playing the game, and then study that list from time to time.
- 4. Use flashcards.** A quick way to build a large vocabulary is to study a number of words via flashcards. In today's digital age, a wide array of smartphone apps make flashcards convenient and easy to organize. Aiming for one new word a day is reasonable. You can always go for more, but it may not be reasonable to assimilate dozens of English words every single day.
- 5. Subscribe to "word of the day" feeds.** Some web platforms will provide you with a word a day—either on a website, an app, or via email—to help you expand your vocabulary. You can add these words to running word lists.

Supporting Readers



Reading is the greatest indicator of future success in children. It is also incredibly enjoyable and beneficial to every aspect of their academic, emotional, and mental development. Everyone knows that reading is incredibly important! However, it can be hard to get children to read at home. Here are 6 steps to create a reading culture in your home.

RELATIONSHIPS



Reading is a great way to develop relationships. Make time to read together, discuss what you have read, and celebrate reading. Consider listening to audiobooks as a family, reading to a sibling, and promote the rich conversations you have about books. Enthusiasm for reading is vital: children who enjoy reading are statistically much stronger readers.

ROUTINES



Children now receive the majority of their reading from in game communications (video games), and social media messages. So, turn off the Wi-Fi and TV, and make time for reading. Remember, twenty minutes a night is all it takes to maximise academic progress. Set page or time targets to fit in with your home schedule.

RESPONSES



Book talk is an essential part of the reading process. Check in with your child about how their book is going and what is happening. Consider rewards for page progress and celebrate every book your child reads. "Tell me about..." "Are you enjoying..." and "Do you think that..." for example.

RESEARCH



Find the niche! Whatever it is your child enjoys, search for the book, series, or genre to keep them entertained. There IS a book out there for everyone! Look in local libraries, speak to their teachers or other parents, check bookstore websites, and create a buzz about reading with your child related to other topics they enjoy.

REFLECTIONS



Reading is a journey of discovery, which means children are constantly discovering things about what they enjoy and whether books are the right difficulty/interest level for them. Encourage your child to pursue what they enjoy! Work out what motivates your child to read and bottle that magic!

RESILIENCE



Finally, encourage resilience and consistency. If your child doesn't read one night, encourage them and support them to get back into the routine. In a world of distractions, reading can fall down the hierarchy! Encourage returning to an old favourite or begin a brand-new book - whatever it takes to get back on the reading journey.

WELL-BEING SUPPORT

SHINE

Our SHINE team, who work in our school to support parents and teachers with information, advice and guidance about how best to help children and young people who are experiencing new or emerging difficulties, delivered assemblies to all year groups. The assemblies talked about some of the difficulties young people are facing and how their service can support. The team also explained how to access this support via Form Tutors and the Pastoral Support Team.

The team also send into school App of the Month which is shared on posters around school and via ClassCharts. November saw the App 'Headspace' shared. This App focusses on using meditation to help with stress, focus and even sleeping better.

KINDNESS UK

Our work with the charity Kindness UK continues in school and we were delighted when they came into school to present our Kindness Champions with T-Shirts and badges to wear. They also sent motivational posters to display around school, encouraging us all to be Kind. Kindness Champions also wore an item of yellow on the 2nd November to mark Yellow Day, a day to promote the importance of being kind.



ANTI-BULLYING

Our Dian Award trained Anti-bullying Ambassadors in Year 10 continue to work on a weekly basis with all Year 7 forms, and have also been into local primary schools to promote their work, hoping for a smooth transition for the next new pupils to our school. UK BEBRAS COMPUTATIONAL CHALLENGE

The UK Bebras Computational Challenge is an online competition open to students in the UK and around the World. Back in November, 160 Year 8 students from Cardinal Allen took part in it.

The challenge tested student's logic and computational thinking skills through different types of fun and engaging problems. The aim of the challenge was to correctly solve as many problems as they could in 40 minutes.

All students enjoyed the challenge and we are delighted to say that all students who took part qualified to receive a certificate.

Kalvin Townsend came top of the school with 183 points.

Jack Anderton, Summer Holt and Logan Williams achieved a Gold Award certificate for being recognised as scoring amongst the top ten percent in the country.

The Geography Department have, once again, been awarded the Secondary Geography Quality Mark with Centre of Excellence by the Geographical Association.

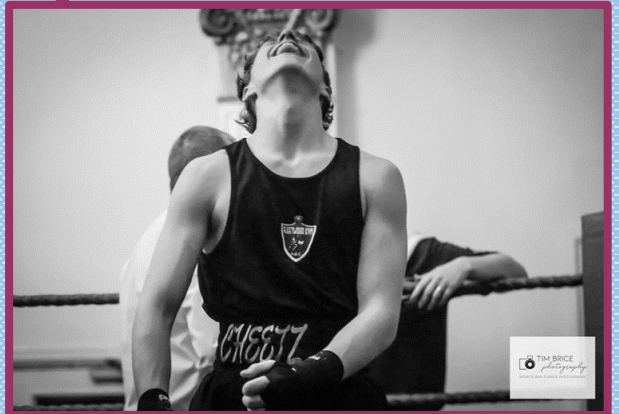
